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Introduction

- The purpose of a facilities audit is to record on-the-ground evidence of the effectiveness and application of the governance systems in place to maintain compliance with standard conditions of the establishment licence and Code of Practice for the Housing and Care of Animals Bred, Supplied or Used for Scientific Purposes and making decisions about regulatory actions required to reduce risk.
- 2. An audit is primarily supportive and aims to recognise areas where systems are appropriate to maintain compliance as well as identifying areas where improvements could be made. Although non-compliance may be detected during an audit it is not primarily an enforcement activity but a monitoring and educational activity.
- 3. Establishments must be able to demonstrate that they are providing care that satisfies the physiological, ethological and healthcare needs of the protected animals they are responsible for. There must be an adequate number of appropriately trained and educated staff to carry out husbandry tasks and to make sure that animal wellbeing is safeguarded.
- 4. Establishments must be able to demonstrate a system of administration and supervision through which the use of animals is managed, the wellbeing of animals and staff is protected, and accountability is assured. The establishment will set up local systems and processes to continuously improve research quality and safeguard the animals by promoting good practice, reducing adverse incidents, ensuring lessons are learned and preventing poor performance.
- 5. Governance will apply to everyone in the establishment connected to the use of animals; including Named Persons, licensees, and support staff. It is the Named Person Responsible for Compliance's (NPRC) responsibility to ensure robust systems are in place to achieve effective governance in an establishment.
- 6. The purpose of this document is to provide an audit template for a facilities audit of an establishment to determine if the standard conditions of the establishment licence and Code of Practice for the Housing and Care of Animals Bred, Supplied or Used for Scientific Purposes are being complied with.

Additional finding: The unpredictable nature of the external noise from the protesters and their other activities, such as poking of cameras through ventilation slots, appears to have resulted in a state of heightened alertness and chronic stress response in some dogs in the building closest to the camp. The establishment has in place mitigations to minimise the impact of this potential stressor on the dogs, which is otherwise out-with the control of the PEL holder.

Reasoning or clarification (optional if compliant)

The environment takes account of the physiological and ethological needs of the dogs held within. However, in the building closest to the protester activity, along the fence line, the dogs experience exposure to long periods of drumming, sirens, loud hailers, whistles and music on an irregularly irregular basis. The unpredictable nature of the external noise, which is out-with the control of the PEL holder, and other activities, such as poking of cameras through ventilation slots, appears to have resulted in a state of heightened alertness resulting in chronic stress response; this manifested as over excitement and pacing in some of the dogs in this building. This behaviour was not evident in the dogs in any of the other buildings.

Reasoning or clarification (optional if compliant)

Pack animals vocalise when there is a change in circumstance, to alert their conspecifics e.g. when staff enter a building. This appeared to be no different from any other kennelled environment.

However, the unpredictable nature of the external noise close to the building nearest to the protester activity, including exposure to long periods of drumming, sirens, loud hailers, whistles and music, which are out-with the control of the PEL holder, appears to have resulted in a state of heightened alertness and extended periods of barking. This behaviour was not evident in the dogs in any of the other buildings.

The alarms on site need to be audible to the security staff who are on site 24/7; this will enable a swift response when required. The audible range of the alarms was not investigated further. However, given the security workings of the site, alarms would be swiftly dealt with and turned off.

Groups of stock dogs are housed in an environment with a degree of complexity in the home cage. This includes access to different levels, platforms, ramps, barrels to hide or sleep in or lookout from, and a suspended chew on a chain. There is also line-of-sight to other conspecifics housed in different cages.

Groups of dogs are allowed into internal group play areas on a regular rotating basis, where they are provided with a variety of toys and substrates to explore and manipulate. The exposure to this environment is significantly more complex than that in their home cage. Free access to toys and the play area may lead to territorial and guarding behaviour that may be detrimental to the animals' welfare if this access was not carefully managed.

Breeding bitches, approaching parturition, are singly housed. Timely provision of suitable materials, including beds, during these periods of single housing enables nesting and nursing behaviours to be expressed.
